Here are some highlights from the autumn term

Connect Education Trust has been pioneering digital learning techniques for many years and prides itself on being tech-savvy.

Effective technology integration enhances teaching and learning experiences. It promotes pupils' engagement, collaboration, critical thinking and creativity.

More than three years ago, the Trust invested over £1 million to provide a Chromebook for each child, ensuring that our schools can access our digital learning programme. The Trust bought an additional 500 Chromebooks this term to replenish equipment in all schools.



All schools within the Trust use the Google Workspace for Education which provides tools to aid teaching and learning such as Google Classroom, Google Docs, Google Meet, Google Forms and Google Chat.

NAO robots are used to provide personalised and adaptive learning experiences for pupils such as learning a foreign language (Spanish), English as an additional language, reading and SEND. This has improved their knowledge, social skills and self-esteem.

The Moki activity wristband trackers have helped to develop health habits and have provided teachers

with data to monitor children's activity levels incorporating movement breaks in the day.



Virtual reality headsets have provided more immersive learning experiences in class. It has allowed our pupils to explore new environments and scenarios. The impact is pupil engagement and retention of information has significantly improved.



Connect Education Trust will continue with its strategy to work hard to upskill the next generation with core knowledge to ensure that all our pupils are properly prepared for the challenges they will face in the 21st century. Our education strategy for ICT is also built around closing the skills gap in computer science and offering equality of access through high quality digital learning opportunities to all our pupils across Connect schools.

Digital School Awards

These schools are among the pioneers in England to receive this award, which recognises excellence in digital learning and teaching. Congratulations to both schools for this outstanding achievement!

The awards ceremony took place on 6th October at Bowes. It was a fantastic event. The children were a real credit to both schools and to themselves. They spoke confidently about how they use digital technology in school and answered lots of questions about their use of VR headsets, Marty the Robot, Google Suite, Moki Activity Trackers, Crumble Controllers and Google Passport.



Connect partners with Dr Fiona Aubrey-Smith

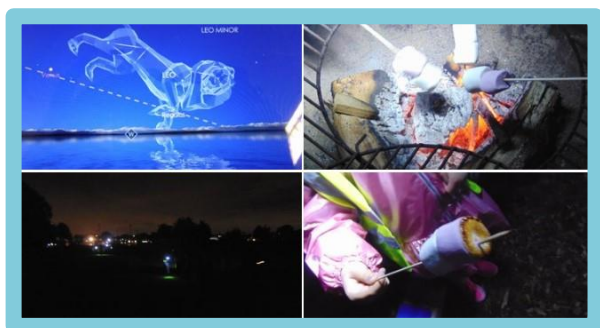
This year we are working together across the Trust to research best practice in teaching and learning and the use of digital technology.

The focus of work this term has been on our partnership work with Dr Fiona Aubrey-Smith. Fiona published a book "From Edtech to Pedtech" at the end of August which has instantly become an education bestseller. A team of Deputy Headteachers from each of the schools have worked together alongside the Chief Education Officer, the Director of Digital Learning and author, Dr Fiona Aubrey-Smith, to create a set of pedagogical principles and practices for all Connect schools. This research project has involved visiting classrooms across all of the schools in the Trust, speaking with pupils and discussing as a group the different pedagogical beliefs, intentions and strategies that are effective in supporting the learning process.

This project is set to continue throughout the year with dates set in the Spring and Summer term. As a result of this groundbreaking work Connect Education Trust has been invited to share the research findings at the World Education Summit in March 2024.

Grange Park Primary School



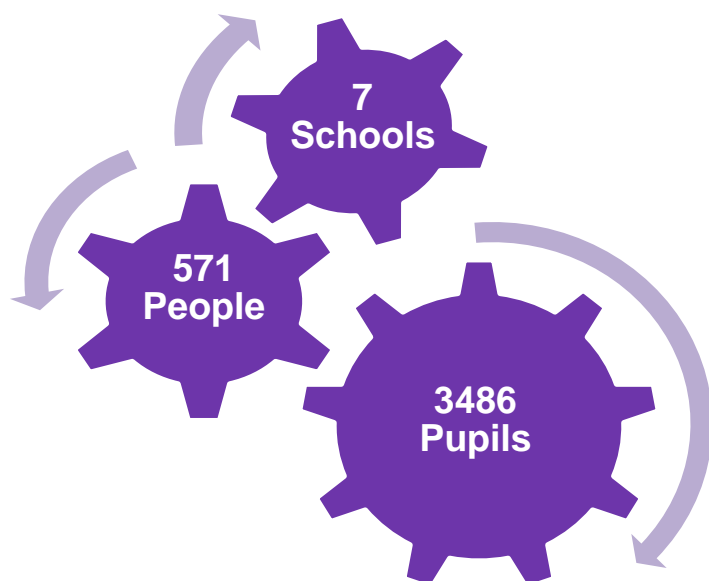
